

DREXEL HOSTS OHIO PREMIERE OF AWARD-WINNING, STAR-STUDDED SHORT FILM THE MAGIC BRACELET

Post-Screening Q&A Panel to Include Academy Award Winner Diablo Cody, Who Adapted Filmmaker Rina Goldberg's Original Story Following Her Death from Mitochondrial Disease at the Age of 15

On Thursday, September 22, the Drexel Theatre and Abbott Nutrition will host the Ohio premiere of *The Magic Bracelet*, an award-winning short film produced by the Los Angeles-based non-profit, Make A Film Foundation. The story was written by Rina Goldberg, a young filmmaker who lost her battle with mitochondrial disease in 2010 at the age of 15. The event begins at 7pm with the screening of *Love Life, Dream Big, Be Positive*, a 21-minute, behind-the-scenes documentary chronicling Rina's journey with mitochondrial disease and the making of the film. The documentary will be followed by the Ohio debut of the 18-minute short film, *The Magic Bracelet*, and a Q&A panel discussion.

Panel members will include Ari and Stacy Goldberg (Rina's parents and residents of Bexley); Tamika Lamison, the film's producer and founder and executive director of the Make A Film Foundation; and Dr. Scott Hickey, a specialist in molecular and human genetics at Nationwide Children's Hospital. Joining live via Skype will be the film's director, Jon Poll (*Charlie Bartlett, Meet the Fockers, Austin Powers*), and screenwriter Diablo Cody (Oscar winner for *Juno*) who adapted Rina's story.

Tickets are \$10 and include admission to the screenings of both the behind-the-scenes documentary and short film as well as the post-screening Q&A. Proceeds will benefit MitoAction, United Mitochondrial Disease Foundation, and the Make A Film Foundation. About Rina Goldberg

Since birth, Rina endured a plethora of medical challenges associated with mitochondrial disease, making hospitalizations and medical procedures a regular routine. In 2009, her disease became more advanced, and she essentially became homebound. During that time, family friend Mitchell Eiven, president of Movie and Theater Corporation, wanted to distract Rina from her medical challenges, and began working with her to conceptualize an idea for a movie. With Eiven's encouragement and professional background, Rina's imagination soared with possibilities, and *The Magic Bracelet* quickly grew into a very real, truly magical movie project.

Rina took her responsibilities as junior producer, junior director, and junior writer very seriously, not letting her disease stand in the way of production even as she faced her most difficult time medically. Working from her bed or couch, she reached out to people around the world for inspiration, her dedication to *The Magic Bracelet* never wavering.

Rina left this world on December 29, 2010, at the age of 15, but her legacy lives on through this film. What started as a therapeutic, creative outlet for one has evolved into a source of inspiration for many. Some of Rina's final words to her mom were, "Promise to take care of my film."

About Mitochondrial Disease

Mitochondrial disease is an inherited, chronic illness that affects the tiny organelles found in almost every cell in the body called mitochondria. Mitochondria are the "powerhouse of the cell," and are responsible for creating more than 90% of cellular energy. When they fail to produce enough energy for cell function (mitochondrial disease), it causes cell injury that leads to cell death resulting in debilitating physical, developmental, and cognitive disabilities. Symptoms including poor growth, loss of muscle coordination, muscle weakness and pain, vision and/or hearing loss, gastrointestinal issues, and organ failure.
